LIGHTING THE ADVENT WREATH

We light the first candle to remember those persons whom we have loved and lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices. We give thanks for the memory that binds them to us this season which anticipates Christmas. May God's eternal love surround them.

The first candle is lit. A brief silence is kept.

We light the second candle to redeem the pain of loss: the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, the loss of health. As we gather up the pain of the past, we offer it to you, O God, asking that into our open hands you will place the gift of peace. Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light. *Matthew 11.28-30*

The second candle is lit. A brief silence is kept.

We light the third candle to remember ourselves this Christmas time. We pause and remember the past weeks, months, and for some of us, years of difficult times. We remember the poignancy of memories, the grief, the sadness, the hurts, the pain of reflecting on our own mortality. Let us remember that dawn defeats darkness.

The third candle is lit. A brief silence is kept.

We light the fourth candle to remember our faith and the gift of hope which God offers to us in the Christmas story. We remember that God, who shares our life, also promises us a place and time where pain and suffering will be no more.

Let us remember the God who shows the way and who goes with us into our tomorrows.
